HSC CARE GRANTS MAKING A DIFFERENCE

Hemlock Semiconductor's Community and Regional Empowerment (CARE) Fund grants are one way HSC continues to give back to the community. Grants are awarded quarterly to local organizations who demonstrate need. In 2021, more than \$250,000 was granted to groups who applied and were chosen by the HSC CARE Grant Committee based on how their goals aligned with our mission to improve the quality of life across the Great Lakes Bay Region.

For the first quarter of 2022, HSC awarded a grant to **Camp Fish Tales** to build a fully accessible playground for children of all ages and abilities. This fully adaptable playground will help remove both physical and social barriers to exclusion to give children the freedom to play regardless of ability.

Another grant went to **Phoenix Community Farm** for their work addressing food and financial security in the community. They intend to expand programming and create a more sustainable model to support even more Midland families.

Finally, the **Friends of Theodore Roethke Foundation** received a grant for the restoration of his historic family residences in Saginaw.







The Bay County Department on Aging received a grant to purchase a new refrigerator and proofing rack for its meal delivery program for local seniors.

Grants are awarded quarterly, and local programs can receive up to \$10,000 while regional programs are eligible for up to \$30,000. The deadline for the next round of CARE grants is September 30, 2022.
