# EMPLOYEES GIVE BACK

HSC employees have always been generous supporters of the United Way organizations across the Great Lakes Bay Region and this year was no exception. Our employees exceeded their goal of raising \$100,000 with a total of \$112,083. Employees were able to designate the county for their donation, so the campaign will benefit the Saginaw, Midland, and Bay County United Ways and include projects such as mobility ramps for Project Independence, Free Books for the Imagination Library, support to reduce water shutoffs for Saginaw homeowners, rental assistance to over 8,000 families, and more.

"It was invigorating to see how the whole site pulled together and showed how important giving back to the community can be," said Jaime Modolo, HSC Reliability Engineer and chairperson of the United Way Committee. "The organizations we helped support are the backbone of our local communities, serving everyone from victims of domestic violence to groups protecting our natural resources. ### **MTU AND HSC CONNECT** STUDENTS TO STEM CAREER PATHWAYS

This fall, HSC partnered with Michigan Technological University and Heritage High School in Saginaw Township to sponsor "Unboxed Challenges," a program designed to help students discover educational pathways and hone future workforce skills in the areas of science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Nearly 100 students participated in the event, which encouraged critical thinking, analysis, teamwork, and resilience. Facilitated by the MTU student organization Mind Trekkers, Heritage students worked together in teams to decipher real-world scenarios and clues using STEM concepts.

#### HSC CARE GRANTS STRENGTHENING OUR COMMUNITY

Three times each year, HSC awards grants to community organizations and initiatives across the Great Lakes Bay Region through our Community and Regional Empowerment (CARE) Fund. Eligible nonprofit organizations can apply for grants up to \$30,000 to support programs or projects that align with HSC's mission to improve the quality of life for area residents.

Our final round of grants for 2022 include:

The Great Lakes Bay Region Mental Health Partnership

will receive a grant for their iMatter Anti-Stigma campaign to combat deep-rooted stigmas surrounding mental health – one of the biggest reasons why people avoid seeking help. It is estimated that one in five people will experience mental illness in their lifetime and reducing the misperceptions about mental health will encourage more people to get the help they need. With support from HSC CARE funds, the iMatter campaign will produce a series of videos and articles that highlight the stories of people who have experienced mental health issues and how they overcame them.

The **Mid-Michigan Children's Museum** will use their HSC CARE grant to replace the museum's HVAC system. This will allow them to continue providing a safe and comfortable environment for hands-on, "Play and Learn" activities and exhibits that engage and motivate children to use their curiosity and creativity to learn about the wonders of our world. The heating and cooling upgrades will also improve energy efficiency, which will help the museum to remain an affordable educational activity for families across the Great Lakes Bay Region.



A HSC CARE grant will allow **Pit & Balcony Community Theatre** to upgrade their lighting systems with digital technology and energy-saving LEDs. Pit & Balcony has been a dynamic organization in the Great Lakes Bay arts community for more than 90 years, engaging artists and audiences through enriching performing arts experiences.
