Employee Spotlight: Honoring IT Director's 40 years of service

When Keith Carey began his career at Hemlock Semiconductor in 1981, he was one of the first two high school student co-ops in the company's history. A pioneer even then, Keith remains a trailblazer as HSC's Chief Information Officer, where he leads the development

and implementation of computing technology across the enterprise. Keith was recently honored for 40 years of distinguished service with Hemlock Semiconductor and Dow Corning.

Through four decades in the chemical industry, Keith truly has seen it all. He traveled the world to work on Dow Corning technology projects. When HSC spun off from Dow Corning as an independent company, he was there to build out the complex information technology needed to support the new enterprise. More recently, he's led the adoption of gamechanging innovations like cloud computing, artificial intelligence and machine learning to improve HSC's processes and products.

His favorite thing about working at HSC? Keith says it's the family-oriented culture: "We care for one another at HSC. We may have our differences at times, but we also have a common goal that binds us together and it's all hands on deck to achieve it. Hemlock is a place where people do things beyond what's expected of them. That's what makes it great. And it's on all of us to sustain that culture."

Keith notes that the most rewarding part of his job is seeing his team develop and grow and take ownership of their work. "I constantly remind myself to pause and to provide opportunity rather than give direction. It's my job to help every member of my team reach their full potential."

Expansion project aims for April 2024 completion

Staying on the cutting edge of polysilicon technology means HSC must invest in new facilities and equipment that keep us ahead of the competition and provide our global semiconductor and solar customers with best-inclass products. That's why our Next Generation Finishing (NGF) project is so important to HSC's future success. Project leaders Josh Mueller and Todd Graham report that electrical equipment has now been energized to provide permanent power to the new facility. Installation of the main production equipment began in November and most major equipment has now been delivered to the site, reducing construction-related truck traffic on local roads. Inside the ultra-high-tech facility, commissioning activities will start in the first quarter of the new year with project completion expected by the end of April 2024.

Rural mental health services get HSC CARE grant boost

Access to mental health services in rural areas of Midland County will see improvements through a new partnership between Family and Children's Services of Mid-Michigan and Greater Midland's Coleman Family Center. With support from an HSC CARE grant, this innovative collaboration aims to remove barriers such as affordability, transportation and stigma to improve access to mental health treatment. Counseling support and treatment improves lives by decreasing a multitude of mental health issues, including depression, anxiety, substance abuse and family issues. People also perform better at their jobs when their personal lives are fulfilled and they have quality mental well-being.

Investing in programs that improve the quality of life across the Great Lakes Bay Region is a key goal of HSC's Community and Regional Empowerment (CARE) Fund. Awarded three times each year, HSC CARE grants make a difference by providing vital funding for organizations and initiatives that work to build resilient, sustainable communities.

In the latest round of CARE grants, HSC also is helping The WELL of Saginaw fulfill their mission to support homeless men by providing job-related skills for the residents of the organization's Men's Shelter. The WELL will use the funds to purchase a large storage shed, organization for the shed and lawn equipment. The shed will provide storage for lawn equipment to maintain the property and a secure place to store tools and equipment for team-building activities such as landscaping and gardening, as well as volunteer projects across the community.

Schools, government units and local groups with 501(c)(3) designation may apply for the first round of 2024 HSC CARE grants through the Bay Area Community Foundation, Midland Area Community Foundation or Saginaw Community Foundation.
